# A WORD FROM FATHER TOM

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Although this Sunday we celebrate the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time, in our society this weekend we celebrate Valentine's Day or St. Valentine's Day. I would like to take some time today to talk a bit about the origins of this day.

St. Valentine was a priest in third-century Rome who helped Christians who were being persecuted for their faith. One of the services he offered was to perform marriages for Christians during this persecution, which led to his patronage of young people, those in love, and happy marriages.

Valentine was discovered and arrested. Authorities threatened him with torture unless he renounced his faith. He refused and was beaten with clubs, then beheaded. He died on Feb 14th in the year 269.

Legend has it that before he was beheaded, he converted his jail guard by healing the man's daughter, restoring sight to her and writing her a note, which he signed, "From your Valentine." In the Middle Ages, his feast was connected with the tradition of courtly love.



Much of his story is unreliable, so the official calendar of the Church uses today, commemorates Ss. Cyril and Methodius. St. Valentine still remains on the calendar for local veneration in Rome

That being said, Valentine's Day is special for those in marriages where there is a mutually enriching relationship. It is special for couples who are dating or engaged. It is special for dear friends. It is a day for giving gifts of candy, flowers, loving cards, enjoyable times together and dinners. However some would like to ignore Valentine's Day: recent widows and widowers, those living together who are estranged, those struggling as single mothers or fathers or anyone because of age, depression or who feel alone. How can those who are celebrating look at their celebration from another perspective? How can those who want the day to be invisible, see their lives from another perspective?

The answer is contained in God's Word to us. Whoever we are, we are first loved by God at the moment of conception in our mother's womb. This love remains a constant in our lives. The truth is: God's love is our first valentine. So whether we celebrate openly or desire the day to fall off the calendar, we can all celebrate God's love on Valentine's Day. We do this by reflecting on his word to each of us individually:

"You I have chosen, my friend; I will never let you go." — Isaiah 41

"I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learned from my Father"—John 15

"Nothing, therefore, can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried or being persecuted. For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, nor angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, nor any power or height or depth, nor any created thing can come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus, our Lord." — Romans 8
